"During the summer of 2010 while attending Camp Emerald Bay, I was given an opportunity to shoot at all three shooting ranges - archery, rifle, and shotgun. It was the end of the second to last day of camp, and I had some free time. The staff was kind enough to let me shoot. I had shot the rifle and drew the bow and it was very close to the end of free-time so I decided to head up to the shotgun range. The range master gave me the basic tutorial on how to shoot the gun safely and let me at it. Ten targets later and breaking all ten clays I was hooked. Now, five years, four state, three national, and one international competition later, I'm still in love with it."
